URBAN AGRICULTURE & FOOD SAFETY CERTIFICATE

The Urban Agriculture/Food Security program provides students with practical hands-on learning that the agricultural industry demands, while giving special attention to the ecological and social justice aspects of the discipline. At its core, the program focuses on organic and sustainable agriculture systems as a way of introducing students to premium markets, the importance of land stewardship, and to demonstrate techniques that can be used to adapt to a changing climate.

With the primary focus being on land preparation, crop production and post-harvest business opportunities, the program provides an overview of the ecological and social justice elements that are impacted by the changing landscape of agriculture and food production. Special attention is given to providing access to the prominent demographics surrounding the college through use of ESL support and seminars in both regional/seasonal recipes and medicinal uses for native plants.

HOW QUICKLY CAN I COMPLETE THE PROGRAM AND WHEN CAN I START?

Students can begin the program any quarter. It generally takes 1-2 years depending on the number of courses a student is enrolled in per quarter and if the student is completing the program for credit/non-credit.



CREDIT/NON-CREDIT OPTIONS:

The Urban Agriculture & Food Safety Certificate can be taken for college credit (47 credits)* or taken for non-credit at a reduce tuition cost. Upon successfully completing the program, credit students will have the certificate placed on their transcript and can be applied towards the Entrepreneurship AAS degree w/an emphasis in Urban Agriculture. Non-credit students will receive a Certificate of Completion.

*Credit students must complete 3 additional courses.

FUNDING ELIGIBILITY FOR COLLEGE CREDIT STUDENTS

(OPTIONAL):

The WES department at Highline College can provide tuition assistance and support services for some CE short-term certificates and professional/technical AAS programs if a student meets funding and program eligibility criteria.
